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Brief History

Opera began over 400 years ago in Italy during the late 1500s to blend music, storytelling, and theater. Originally performed for royalty and aristocrats, it soon spread across Europe, evolving into a beloved public art form. In 1637, the first public opera house, Teatro San Cassiano opened in Venice, Italy, with L'Andromeda by Francesco Manelli. This marked a turning point, allowing everyday citizens to experience opera firsthand. Over time, composers like Mozart, Verdi, and Puccini helped shape the opera we know today, full of dramatic characters, colorful costumes, and powerful music.

Today, opera remains a vibrant and relevant art form. Modern productions explore current themes like justice, identity, and climate change, while new technologies—like digital sets and livestreamed performances, make opera more accessible than ever. Whether performed in grand theaters or community spaces, opera continues to connect people through emotion, storytelling, and the magic of live performance.



LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will:

- Identify basic opera vocabulary (e.g., aria, duet, tenor, etc.)
- Recognize opera voice types and their storytelling function
- Participate in vocal warm-ups and sing an opera melody
- Practice respectful audience behavior and artistic reflection
- Explore emotional expression through music and movement







VOCABULARY

Opera - A staged musical art form combining singing, acting & orchestration.

Aria - A solo song that expresses a character's emotion.

Duet - A piece sung by two performers.

Trio - A musical number for three singers.

Tutti - "All together"; the whole ensemble sings or plays.

Soprano - Highest female voice type.

Mezzo - Medium female voice, often bold or mischievous.

Tenor - Highest male voice type; often the hero.

Baritone - Medium-low male voice; often comic or villainous.


Pants Role - Female singer plays a young male character.

Bravo - Ways to cheer for male performers!

Brava - Ways to cheer for female performers!

Bravi - Ways to cheer for a group of performers!
